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### **Directory of EU-level stakeholder organisations**

ProFouND aims to influence policy and to increase awareness of falls and innovative prevention programmes amongst all sectors and organisations that work with older people.

The central objective of WP 8 is to facilitate uptake and implementation of best practice solutions for fall prevention developed through ProFouND, by increasing awareness of the issue and promoting uptake of proven prevention strategies by government, industry, professionals and organisations in areas that relate to health of older adults and fall-prevention in particular.

#### Aim ProFouND- D 8.3

EU-level representative bodies could serve a great function in facilitating more focussed actions for fall prevention in countries and regions by raising awareness among their members and promoting the uptake of ProFouND deliverables.

For that purpose, this Directory presents an overview of *relevant EU-level governmental and non-governmental organisations* –E(N)GOs – and identifies the potential contribution these organisations may provide to the wider dissemination of ProFouND's evidence base and tools.

The Directory will also provide a template for partners to build their own directory on national and local level stakeholders across all sectors and disciplines whose commitment is critical for implementing multi-sectoral fall prevention policies and programmes.

The Directory EU-level stakeholders is a first step in the process of EU-level network building in view of enhancing uptake and consolidating country level implementation of ProFouND deliverables. The second step will be to organise a series of high level meetings of governmental, quasi governmental and non-governmental organisations. The focus here will be to encourage identified stakeholder organisations to build synergies between their respective actions, and create opportunities for more co-ordinated actions, at EU and inter/intra country levels in line with the EIP-AHA action group on fall prevention (Task 8.2/ D 8.2-8.5: M8,20,32).
